1 Industry overview and employability skills

The **Regional Supply Chain and Logistics Industry** is essential to the operation of all Australian businesses to ensure delivery, distribution and communications between companies and customers.

You may be wondering what is the meaning of supply chain and logistics?

A *supply chain* is a network of businesses and activities that takes a product from raw material suppliers all the way to end consumers. One example of a supply chain is moving agricultural produce, like an apple, from the farm to the supermarket.

By definition, *logistics* refers to the processes of acquiring, transporting, and storing resources along the supply chain.

This growing industry is comprised of a diverse range of occupations and provides thousands of jobs for individuals with varying skill sets.

Victoria's location gives it a supply chain advantage, making it an attractive place for businesses to locate. Victoria's supply chain & logistics industry contributes approximately A\$21 billion per year to the economy and employs around 280,000 people.

Regional Victoria has an expansive network of rail and road connected dual purpose freight terminals that supports the efficient movement of freight.

As you go through this book and hear from people working in the industry, you'll discover that the different sectors within Regional Supply Chain and Logistics very often overlap and work together.

Watch Darren, General Manager at Kyabram Cold Storage explain how manufacturing, transport and logistics, warehousing, and the supply chain all work together.





This industry crossover and collaboration means that employability skills, sometimes called *transferrable skills*, are more important than ever and can help you stay flexible and able to contribute in any future workplace.



2d: Nia Phasysoutham

Team Leader – Food Safety Legacy Packing



I was educated in my home country, the Lao People's Democratic Republic. When I left school I entered the workforce as an administration assistant. After that, I became a member of the sales and procurement team. I then moved to Australia where I gained employment as a fruit packer at Legacy Packing. From there, I was offered the Quality Control role as a result of enquiring about any opportunities that would enable me to acquire new skills. I have an eye for detail and believed the inspection work would be a good fit for me, which progressed into my current role as Team Leader of Food Safety.

My role focuses on quality and compliance checks of fruit when it is received from the orchards (before being packed), and also packed product at the dispatch stage. This involves checking that the quality of the fruit meets customer specifications, the accuracy of labelling for

traceability through the supply chain, and accurately recording the results of each inspection. Once complete, I release the pallets of packed produce to the despatch team to finalise the documentation. If there is an issue found, I coordinate with the dispatch and production team to rectify it.

What I love most about this role is the knowledge I have gained. It is interesting to learn about the different specifications and protocols of customers and countries, the different varieties of fruit and which properties make them distinct, and the biosecurity concerns that can occur and how it affects the produce.

Essential skills for this role are:

- · Team leading
- Strong attention to detail
- Efficient planning and task execution
- The ability to communicate clearly in a large multicultural environment.

There is so much potential for growth in this industry. Quality control is just one example of combining skills and interests from one industry (horticulture production), with the supply chain and the demand for people to take on these roles is always high. The other great thing is that these roles are transferrable to almost any town or situ around the world.

Transport and logistics is another important industry that employs nearly 5% of all working Australians. It involves moving goods from one place to another. Sometimes those goods are picked and packed fruit moving via rail and road from Shepparton to Brisbane, other times those goods are entire football teams flying from Melbourne to Perth. Around a third of the workers in this industry have a VET qualification, read on to find out more about possible pathways to employment.

Leaving school after year 12 I fell into the industry accidentally, wrapping pallets as a summer job prior to going to university. Over that summer I fell in love with the industry and applied myself to my new role on the forklift in distribution. I was fortunate enough to have a strong mentor within the business that believed in giving young people a chance to excel in the industry, which really drove me to want to achieve more. I was then given a pathway into management and different facets of the business. I have now been with the business for 10 years.

In my position at Kreskas Bros, I currently oversee 80 staff, and several department managers, and report directly to the managing directors. Some major responsibilities are; the safe and compliant fleet of vehicles following a strict NHVR code to ensure that our fleet operates safely on

the road, meeting client expectations, reaching our KPIs, and ensuring strict adherence to OHS workplace safety standards. I also assist and oversee the compliance of the business, business development, client and key relations, quoting and tendering new parcels of work, along with continuous improvement.

I love the broad range of people I get to deal with within my role. I work with a wide demographic, from large multinational companies, mum and dad businesses, suppliers and staff. I also enjoy finding solutions for problems for our clients and meeting challenges that may arise.

I would advise anyone wanting to try the logistics field to give it a go! We employ over 80 staff and host dozens of professions. It's not just truck drivers and forklift operators who make up integral parts of the supply chain, there are accountants, bookkeepers, administration, schedulers, and middle and upper management to name a few.

My career journey started when I transitioned from school to university where I studied for a Bachelor of Science degree and worked as a lifeguard while studying. I was offered a spot at the University of Glasgow to complete a Masters in Physiotherapy, however, I decided to take a year out to travel instead. My year of travel is currently sitting at 10 years abroad where I spent a lot of time travelling this amazing country, undertaking various jobs and finally settling in regional Victoria. This led me to Hicks Transport where I have now been with the company for 5 years.

I started in reception/data entry and progressed to my current position in customer relations about 12 months ago. I really enjoy building friendships with customers and being able to assist them first-hand, and travelling around and meeting customers face to face is important.

Major responsibilities in my role are:

- Keeping the customers happy this may be simply arranging a pick up from Melbourne or a more pressing matter such as lost or damaged freight
- Ensuring jobs are followed through right to the end, finalizing some invoicing and sending invoices out to customers specifically for one-off loads
- Pallet watch reconciliation this is a small but very important task and if forgotten can cost a lot of money. Reconciling RCTI for some of our larger accounts
- Train new office staff, helping them learn the computer systems and manual systems in place here.

Essential skills required for my role are:

- People skills
- · Attention to detail
- Problem solving
- Working in a team.

There are many directions you can go in the Transport Industry that appeal to different types of people, it is certainly not a career to rule out. Give it a go as there is so much more to transport than driving trucks.

With employment levels expected to grow by over 6% between 2021 and 2026, there may be a warehousing role for you.

When I started my career in Australia, I worked as a fruit packer and also as a supervisor at various pack-houses in Queensland, New South Wales and Victoria.

I began my career with Legacy Packing in June 2020 as a packer and then moved into quality control for despatch and production in October 2020. In June 2021 I was offered the opportunity to work as a Despatch Clerk in the logistics department.

Having a supportive team makes the job easier! We work together to achieve and complete our tasks every day. Gaining knowledge in the logistics department, tackling different challenges and solving them

makes it more exciting. Learning the flow of the supply chain allows me to understand more about my current role and is shaping improvements we make to our system.

The major responsibilities of my role are:

- Making sure that we despatch the correct fruit and deliver the fruit on time to their destinations
- Providing accurate paperwork is essential, especially with export orders which require more detailed information.

A variety of skills are required for my current role including database and software management, good communication skills, great attention to detail, and the ability to perform under pressure and manage time effectively while having a positive attitude.

It is an extremely rewarding industry, I see myself continuing to develop my skills and contribute to the company's success. Learning more about the supply chain and gaining more knowledge about the industry is something I'm really interested in.



First, the pencil has to be manufactured. There are many components made from different materials that make up a pencil.






