Activity 1b: What are employability skills?

Activity 1c: Working at the Port of Melbourne

The Shepparton region is one of the busiest intersections on Australia's national freight network, linking Brisbane to the Port of Melbourne. The Port of Melbourne is Australasia's largest maritime hub for containerised, automotive and general cargo. The Port of Melbourne plays a vital role in the Australian economy by providing an international gateway for imports and exports.

What items travel in containers?

Containers are the main type of cargo passing through the Port of Melbourne. Containers are large steel boxes used to carry items such as electronic goods, fruit, clothes and furniture.

What is a breakbulk item? List some examples of breakbulk items that are important to communities.

A breakbulk item is any large or oddly shaped cargo that doesn't usually fit inside a container. Some examples of breakbulk items are:

- Cars
- Steel
- Logs
- Large vehicles (Trains, Trams, etc.)

What is a dry bulk cargo? List some examples of dry bulk items that you use at home.

Dry bulk cargoes are loose dry products which are handled in large amounts. Dry bulk cargo is not put into a container but is poured directly into the storage sections of a ship.

What is liquid bulk cargo? List some examples of liquid bulk products.

Liquid bulk cargoes are large volumes of liquids which are carried in special ships known as tankers. Some examples of liquid bulk items are:

- Petrol
- Crude oil
- · Chemicals.

What are the 9 steps of the export supply chain?

- 1. The exporter books space on a ship
- 2. The exporter books an empty container.
- 3. The empty container is picked up from container park
- 4. The empty container is taken to a warehouse
- 5. The empty container is packed with cargo
- 6. The full container is taken to the Port of Melbourne
- 7. The container is placed in a queue, depending on its weight and final destination
- 8. The container is loaded onto a ship
- 9. The ship sets sail.

What are the 10 steps of the import supply chain?

- 1. The importer buys goods
- 2. The exporter ships the goods (cargo), using the steps outlined in the export supply chain
- 3. Customs and quarantine clear the cargo
- 4. The ship arrives at the Port of Melbourne
- 5. The container is unloaded from the ship
- 6. The container travels to a warehouse or distribution centre
- 7. The container is unpacked
- 8. The goods inside the container are assigned to a specific shop
- 9. The goods are transported to the shop
- 10. The goods are placed on the shelf for you to buy.

Xavier Hutchinson

Apprentice Maintenance Fitter SPC



What VET Certificates did Xavier complete in secondary school?

Cert 2 in Building and Construction and Cert 2 in Engineering whilst completing his VCE.

In what industries did Xavier complete work experience?

In the building industry and then at SPC in Food Manufacturing and Logistics and a few other big and small business' in the region.

He didn't really know what to do first he tried a variety of different jobs. Driving trucks and cement mixers and then he got a forklift license. An opportunity came up in the export dispatch area and he wasn't sure he was ready for it. But he gave it a go and then other opportunities arose from there.

What qualifications has Brett completed?

Brett has a fork lift license, front line management diploma and has completed other cert 4 courses through his career.

What does Brett identify as having changed in the industry over the last 30 years?

Technology – picking and placing orders is all scanning and RF-type work, used to be all paper based orders.

According to Brett, what is the future of the industry?

Young people. Older people exiting the business and the future is bringing in young people who are interested in the industry and just need to get the experience.

Production Manager

Production Managers plan, organise, direct, control and coordinate the production activities of manufacturing organisations including physical and human resources.

Tasks: They determine, implement and monitor production strategies, policies and plans. Planning details of production activities in terms of output quality and quantity, cost, time available and labour requirements controlling the operation of production plant and quality procedures.

Weekly Pay – \$2,332
Future Growth – Strong
Skill Level – Bachelor Degree or higher qualification

Metal Engineering Process Worker

Metal Engineering Process Workers perform routine tasks in manufacturing metal products.

Tasks: Positioning and holding tools and metal products, performing assembly and dismantling operations such as screwing and bolting operating materials-specific tools to perform tasks required for the production of the final product, soldering and spot welding components using electrical spot and butt welding machines.

How does Simon describe his early career aspirations, education and career journey?

In year 10 he wanted to be a Police Officer, but that didn't work out. He went on to complete 1 year of university before starting in the fruit industry which was close and convenient, and worked his way through box stacking, fork lifting, fruit picking, and pruning.

What is Simon's current role and what are his major tasks and responsibilities in his role?

Simon is the General Manager of Cold Food Store and Logistics at Jeftompson, running one of the biggest packing sheds in Australia. Current role involves organising and controlling fork lift and truck drivers, getting bins of fruit from orchards to packing sheds and to cool stores. Organising the logistics and making sure staff are where they need to be.

What are some of the key attributes required for the job?

Reliability and flexibility to do the required work.

What are some of the biggest changes in his work?

Has gone from manual dockets and excel spreadsheets to now working with apps on phones, computer systems and scanners. Lots of exciting technology and things to come in the industry.

Occupation Career Snapshots – Transport

Transport Services Manager

Transport Services Managers organise and control the buying and selling of vehicles for rental agencies and coordinate the leasing of vehicles, the operations of railway stations, and the operations of enterprises that operate fleets of vehicles to transport goods and passengers.

Tasks: They organise the purchase and maintenance of transport vehicles, equipment and fuel, they also liaise with clients to determine requirements and providing customers with advice and information regarding vehicle type, purchase or hire rates and obligations and handling complaints.

Weekly Pay – \$2,664
Future Growth – Moderate
Skill Level – Associate Degree, Advanced Diploma or Diploma

Transport and Despatch Clerk

Transport and Despatch Clerks verify and maintain records of incoming and outgoing goods, prepare goods for despatch, arrange clearance and collection of imported cargo from customs and bond stores, and arrange shipment of cargo for export.

Tasks: They identify items and containers of incoming and outgoing shipments and verifying them against consignment records, ensuring outgoing shipments are in good condition and meet specifications.

Weekly Pay - \$1,386 Future Growth - Stable Skill Level - Certificate 11 or 111



Occupation Career Snapshots - Logistics

Supply, Distribution and Procurement Managers

Supply, Distribution and Procurement Managers plan, organise, direct, control and coordinate the supply, storage and distribution of goods, products and services produced and used by organisations.

Tasks: They determine, implement and monitor purchasing, storage and distribution strategies, policies and plans, prepare and implement plans to maintain required stock levels at minimum cost.

Weekly Pay – \$2,690 Future Growth – Moderate Skill Level – Bachelor or higher qualification

Purchasing and Supply Logistics Clerk

Purchasing and Supply Logistics Clerks prepare and process orders for goods and services, monitor stock levels and supply sources and maintain stock and inventory levels, record and coordinate the flow of materials between departments, prepare production schedules, and administer and coordinate storage and distribution operations within organisations.

Tasks: They request supplies from stock and send orders to production departments and other firms, receive and check purchase requests against inventory records and stock on hand, examine orders and compiling data for production schedules.

Weekly Pay – \$1,309 Future Growth – Moderate Skill Level – Certificate II or III

Despatch Clerk Legacy Packing




What is Maylora's role and what are her major responsibilities?

First, the pencil has to be manufactured. There are many components made from different materials that make up a pencil.
